

The Anti-Doping Landscape

The <u>World Anti-Doping Agency</u> (WADA) is the independent international body responsible for harmonising anti-doping policies in all sports and all countries. The <u>World Anti-Doping Code</u> is the core document that harmonises anti-doping policies, rules and regulations within sport organisations around the world. The Code is supplemented by eight <u>International Standards</u>, including the <u>Prohibited List</u> that is updated at least annually.

As a <u>Signatory</u> of the World Anti-Doping Code, International Handball Federation (IHF) is responsible for implementing an effective and Code-compliant anti-doping program for the sport of handball, beach handball and wheelchair handball.

IHF also has its own set of anti-doping rules and it is important that those involved in the sport are familiar with them.

IHF has delegated the management and implementation of parts of the IHF anti.doping programme to the <u>International Testing Agency (ITA)</u>, an independent organisation that manages anti-doping programs on behalf of International Federations and Major Event Organisers.

WADA, IHF, the ITA and the National Anti-Doping Organisations (NADOs) coordinate all anti-doping efforts within the sport of IHF.
